- » Look up John 14:15. If you love God, should you have a desire to obey him?
- » We can never obey God perfectly, so talk to God (that's prayer) and thank him for sending his Son, Jesus Christ, who is perfect and who forgives our sin when we repent.
- » Think of a command in the Bible you find hard to obey. God is kind, but maybe it's hard for you to be kind to your sibling. God says to obey your parents, but maybe you don't come right away when called, or go to bed without fussing. If you are a child of God, you can ask him to give you the strength to obey cheerfully and right away.
- » What should you do when you sin (disobey God)?

Hitting a Roadblock: At Babel

Kon'nichiwa, racers! We hope you had an awesome time at *The Incredible Race* today. As we raced to Asia, we learned about when the whole earth spoke the same language. After the flood, God told Noah and his family to spread out and fill the earth. But the people at the plain of Shinar worked together to build a city and a tower reaching to the heavens to keep themselves together. This act of disobedience to God was part of the sin cycle that we learned about yesterday. However, God, in his love, had a plan to help them spread out over the world like he had commanded them. The Bible says that God came down and confused their language, scattering the family groups around the earth. The people walked to their new homes, rode on boats, or traveled on animals, perhaps like our animal pal Jamal the camel. The events at the tower of Babel (Genesis 10-11) explain how people ended up living all around the world, why we may have some different physical characteristics, and why we speak different languages. But we are all part of the same family and need the same Savior, Jesus Christ!

On this leg of the race, we stop at the tower of Babel and check out the important and loving roadblock God provided there.

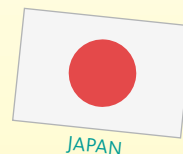
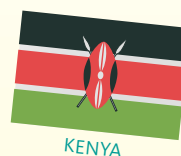

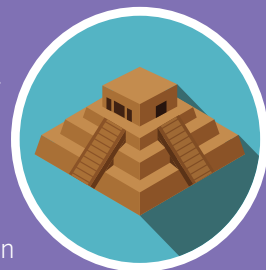

Go and Do

- » Find Genesis 11:1–9 in a Bible. How many times is the word *Babel* used? Then read John 14:15 again. Talk to God and ask him to help you love him and want to obey him more each day.
- » Do you know anyone who lives or has lived in another country? Tell them in person or by letter about the tower of Babel and the start of different languages. Compare how to say phrases like “Hi!” and “Goodbye!” and “How are you?” in your language and theirs. If they are missionaries in another country, thank them for serving God there.
- » If you are a child of God, talk to God and ask him to give you a desire to tell people who live in other countries (and even around you) about Jesus.
- » Ask your parents or guardians if they’ve ever been in a situation when it was hard to communicate with people due to a language barrier. What did they do? How can we communicate God’s love to people in different cultures?

One Race, Many Nations: After Babel

Jambo, racers! As you traveled to Africa today, you learned how people have the same skin-coloring pigments. Our skin produces **melanin**, which makes our skin a lighter or darker shade of brown, depending on how much melanin we produce. As the people left the tower of Babel with their language confused, they spread out over the earth. People in certain areas of the world, who spoke the same language and had similar shades of skin, developed their own interesting traditions and food preferences and ways of living. Even though we may look slightly different, speak different languages, or have different customs, we are not part of different “races.” We are all part of the same race, the human race, beginning from Adam and Eve, the very first people.

On leg three, we see how the human race develops into people groups with different languages, cultures, and physical features, but how we are still one race.

One Way—Jesus: Babel and the Gospel

Bonjour, racers! As you traveled to Europe, the next continent on *The Incredible Race*, you learned that there is only one human race, but there are two spiritual races—those who are part of God’s family and those who aren’t. Because we are born sinful and not part of God’s family, we won’t go to heaven when we die. Instead, we will go to a terrible place called hell. The good news is that God sent his Son to earth. Fully God, but also fully man, Jesus lived a perfect life, dying on the cross to take the punishment for our sins. He rose from the dead on the third day, showing that God accepted his sacrifice. He did all of this because of his great love for us. Repenting of our sins and believing in Jesus is the only way we are able to go to heaven. Jesus paid the price for our sins, providing the way for us to be in God’s family and have eternal life with him. Every person needs to decide whether to live their lives for themselves or to yield their lives to God, becoming part of God’s family.



On our fourth leg, we discover the need to yield our lives to God as he reaches out to all nations, tribes, and peoples with his love.

Green Light-Go: Why Babel Matters Today

Yow from Jamaica, racers! Because God is love and shows his love to us in so many ways, including sending his Son to save us from our sins, wouldn't it make sense for us to pass on God's love to others no matter where they are from or what language they speak? As you explored the account of the Good Samaritan today (Luke 10), you saw how God wants us to love others, not just in words but in deeds. God loves us and wants us to show love and kindness and respect to all people, regardless of what shade of skin they have, how rich or poor they are, how young or old they are, or what country they live in.

On this final leg, we learn that because God loves all people groups, we ought to treat others with love and respect, not prejudice and judgment.

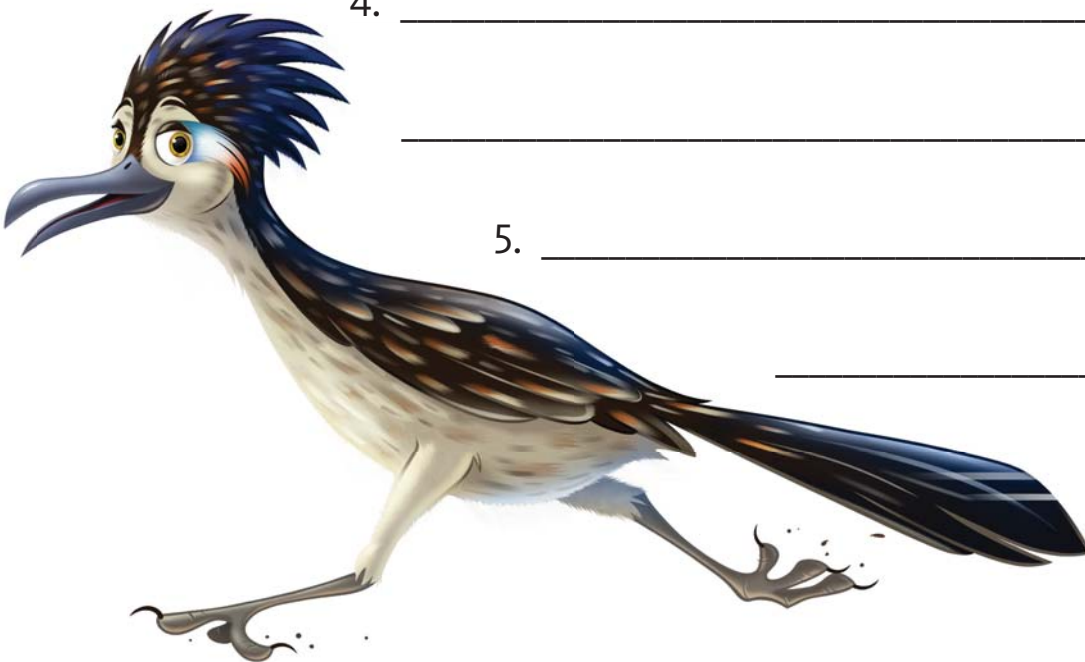
