

Puppet Pal—Always and Forever

Teacher: Boys and girls, let's see if we can get our Puppet Pal, Skye, to come out. On the count of 3, let's all call to him (her). Ready? 1, 2, 3—Skye!

Puppet: Come out somewhat out of breath and rushed, but full of excitement and energy. **Hey, everybody! I'm all packed for my trip.**

Teacher: Where are you going?

Puppet: Well, I want to go on an adventure back in time to when Jesus, the Son of God, began.

Teacher: Ummm . . . there's a little problem with that.

Puppet: What?

Teacher: Boys and girls, Skye said he wants to go back in time to when Jesus, the Son of God started. Does the Son of God have a beginning? Take responses. The Son of God never started. He's always been.

Puppet: But wait! You're saying the Son of God didn't begin? That's impossible! We all have a beginning.

Teacher: It's true that *people* have beginnings. But God didn't begin. He always has been and always will be. When you don't have a beginning or an ending, it's called being eternal.

Puppet: Eternal. So because he doesn't begin or end, God is eternal?

Teacher: Yep! And the Bible says he will never leave you. If you hide under your bed, in your closet, or in the basement, he's still with you. If you travel to the farthest corner of the universe, God is still with you. Anywhere you go, Jesus is with you. He always is!

Puppet: Look all around, up and down. But I don't see him here. Where is he? Jesus! Jesus!

Teacher: We can't see him, but he's here. It's kind of like air. Take a deep breath, everyone. Do so.

Puppet: Act like you're holding it for a really long time, then squeak out: **Can I let it out yet?**

Teacher: Okay, let it out.

Puppet: Dramatically let it out and gasp for breath. **Whew!**

Teacher: Just like we know the air is there even though we can't see it, we also know God is here even though we can't see him. We can't see Jesus standing here as a person right now, but he's still here—he's just invisible. This week, we'll be traveling to time periods when people actually *did* see Jesus as a man! And we'll talk about how someday, we'll get to actually see Jesus, too! Won't that be incredible?

Puppet: It sure will! I can't wait to hear more as we travel through time this week, but I've got to go right now.

Teacher: Okay! Just remember, Jesus always has been and always will be. He's never going away. Let's wave good-bye to Skye, everyone. Do so.

Puppet Pal–Promise Keepers

Teacher: Hi, Skye!! Hey, I'm wondering something.

Puppet: What's that?

Teacher: Is Skye your full name?

Puppet: No, my full name is Skylar Thompson, but Skye is my nickname. But it's not my only nickname. My dad calls me Pie in the Skye.

Teacher: Oh, my _____ used to call me a nickname, too. Mine was _____.

Puppet: That's fun!

Teacher: Yeah, sometimes we have more than one name we go by, huh? Like, in the Bible, there are lots of different names for Jesus, but they're all describing the same person.

Puppet: Like what?

Teacher: He's called Jesus, the Son of God, Christ, the Lord, and the Savior.

Puppet: Cool!

Teacher: And sometimes, back in Old Testament times, he was called the Angel of the Lord. He showed up even before he was born as a baby! Isn't that something?!

Puppet: It really is!

Teacher: He appeared and promised people that various things would happen in the future. Like, he promised Moses that the bad ruler, Pharaoh, would let the Hebrew people go, and that's just what happened. And he promised other people things in the Old Testament, and they all happened, just as he promised. God always, always, always keeps his promises!

Puppet: That makes me feel good to know I can count on God and his Word. If the Bible says it, that settles it. It will happen just as promised!

Teacher: It sure will! In fact, long before Jesus came to earth, promises were recorded that he would come, and he came just as promised. For instance, one promise was that he would be born as a baby, and he was. Another promise was that he would be born in a town called Bethlehem, and he was. Another promise was that there would be a special star, and there was!

Puppet: Jesus is a promise keeper!

Teacher: He sure is!

Puppet: Well, I'm going to go read some more about Jesus in the Bible.

Teacher: Great idea, Skye. You do that, and we'll see you tomorrow. Bye for now!

Puppet Pal–Gospel Presentation Continued

Puppet: Come up. Hey there! What's happenin'?

Teacher: We're just talking about when Jesus came to earth.

Puppet: I would love to travel back in time to see Jesus as a baby and a child and a man!

Teacher: Wouldn't that be something? He was different from anyone. He was a perfect man, not like any other person ever. He never did anything wrong.

Puppet: Wow, I wish I could stop doing stuff wrong!

Teacher: Well, the Bible tells us we all sin. That means we all disobey God. The Bible also says the punishment for sin is death. That's why it's such good news that Jesus came! He took the punishment for sin! If Jesus hadn't come, we would be forever separated from God in a bad, bad place. We wouldn't have any hope of eternal life in heaven with Jesus.

Puppet: I sure am thankful Jesus came!

Teacher: I know! It's kind of like what Sergeant the rescue dog does. Show the Day 3 Animal Pal poster. Sergeant goes out on rescue missions to seek out and save the lives of those who are lost in the wilderness. Well, Jesus came to seek us out and save our lives because even though we may not realize it, we're all born spiritually lost. We are not able to find our way to heaven on our own.

Puppet: So it's really good news that Jesus came and lived and died and came back to life!

Teacher: Yes! It's the best news ever. Jesus did it because he loves you so, so much. That reminds me of our memory verse. Let's stand up and say (or sing) our verse together. Recite (or sing) John 3:16 together using the Memory Verse poster.

Puppet: In our verse, Jesus says that whoever believes in him will have eternal (forever) life.

Teacher: Show the Admit, Believe, Forever Receive sheet. That's right. To become a child of God and receive the gift of eternal life, you first have to admit you're a sinner.

Puppet: What's that mean?

Teacher: It means you tell God you have disobeyed him (sin), like saying unkind words, or hitting someone, or not obeying your parents.

Puppet: I think we've all done all those things.

Teacher: That's right! Now of course, it's impossible to completely stop sinning. But when you admit your sin and turn to God, it means you want to please God and obey him.

Puppet: Then what do you do after you admit you're a sinner?

Teacher: You must believe and trust that Jesus really did come to earth, died on the cross, and came back to life to take the punishment for your sins.

Puppet: And after that?

Teacher: You ask God if you can be his child and be part of his forever family. If any boys and girls are interested in learning more about this, make sure you talk to your parents or your leaders or me today. We'd love to tell you more about it.

Puppet: Well, I need to get going, but thanks for sharing that.

Teacher: You bet, Skye, and we'll look forward to seeing you later. Let's say goodbye to Skye, everyone.

Puppet Pal—Love and Care

Puppet Pal—Perfect Place

Show Day 5 Timeline poster. Remember, our C word for today is *crown*, like the crown for King Jesus. Let's say *crown* together. Do so.

Puppet: But I do have one question. Do you think it will get boring? I mean, it's going to last forever.
